Preparing for Study Abroad

Travel Information

- Students are responsible for making their own travel arrangements. Students will be met at the Granada airport and picked up, provided they supply the necessary travel information one month prior to departure to the on-site coordinator, Amalia Pulgarín.
- Passport/Visa information: Students will need to obtain the following travel documents in order to study in Spain: A passport (valid at least six months beyond the estimated return date) A student visa (students should visit the Consulate of Spain's website for information regarding student visa requirements and procedures.) - Students will receive visa workshop and pre-departure orientation information via e-mail. All workshops and orientations are mandatory. Drop-in hours for visas are Fridays from 2-4pm.
- Students may have an individual Skype session with the on-site coordinator to answer other questions.

- As a BC student, you are required to take a full load of courses at your host institution abroad. BC program participants can refer to the <u>course load requirement table</u>.
- If you have a learning disability, you should discuss with your ISA whether your host university is able to make appropriate accommodations; if so, bring documentation from your doctor or the BC Disabilities Office to support any request for accommodations at your host university.

Housing

- Students will live with a local family in Granada. Families may be a married couple with children, a couple, or a single person. GRIIS will assign a family according to the student's preferences expressed in a family questionnaire. Students may also consult with student returnees. The program cost covers housing plus three meals a day. It will not be necessary to bring sheets, pillows, blankets, etc. with students since these will be provided by the host family. Students will be notified at least two weeks in advance to their departure from Boston of their assigned families and their characteristics (family members, type of housing, etc), and will be given the mailing address and telephone numbers. The Office of International Programs encourages students to get in touch with their host families prior to leaving Boston.
- Cell phones are supplied at orientation. Costs are separate from the program.

- Be aware that the manner in which medical help is obtained, the way patients are treated, the conditions of medical facilities, and how health care is afforded may be quite different from U.S. practices. U.S. health care values, assumptions, and methods are not universally practiced; even notions regarding the onset of an illness or the timing of expert attention may be considered culturally based.
- Refer to your Study Abroad Handbook for further information about health and safety issues including women, LGBT, disabled people and others.
- In the event of a large-scale emergency, such as a natural disaster, you should first text your onsite coordinator; follow the emergency procedures discussed in the onsite orientation; and call or text your parents to let them know where you are and that you are safe.

• Alcohol and Drugs

In many cultures, alcohol consumption is an acceptable part of the culture and people are taught to drink in moderation at home. Many countries have a lower drinking age than the U.S. while other countries have drinking and drug abuse laws that may be more severe. Students are subject to the laws of their host country.
