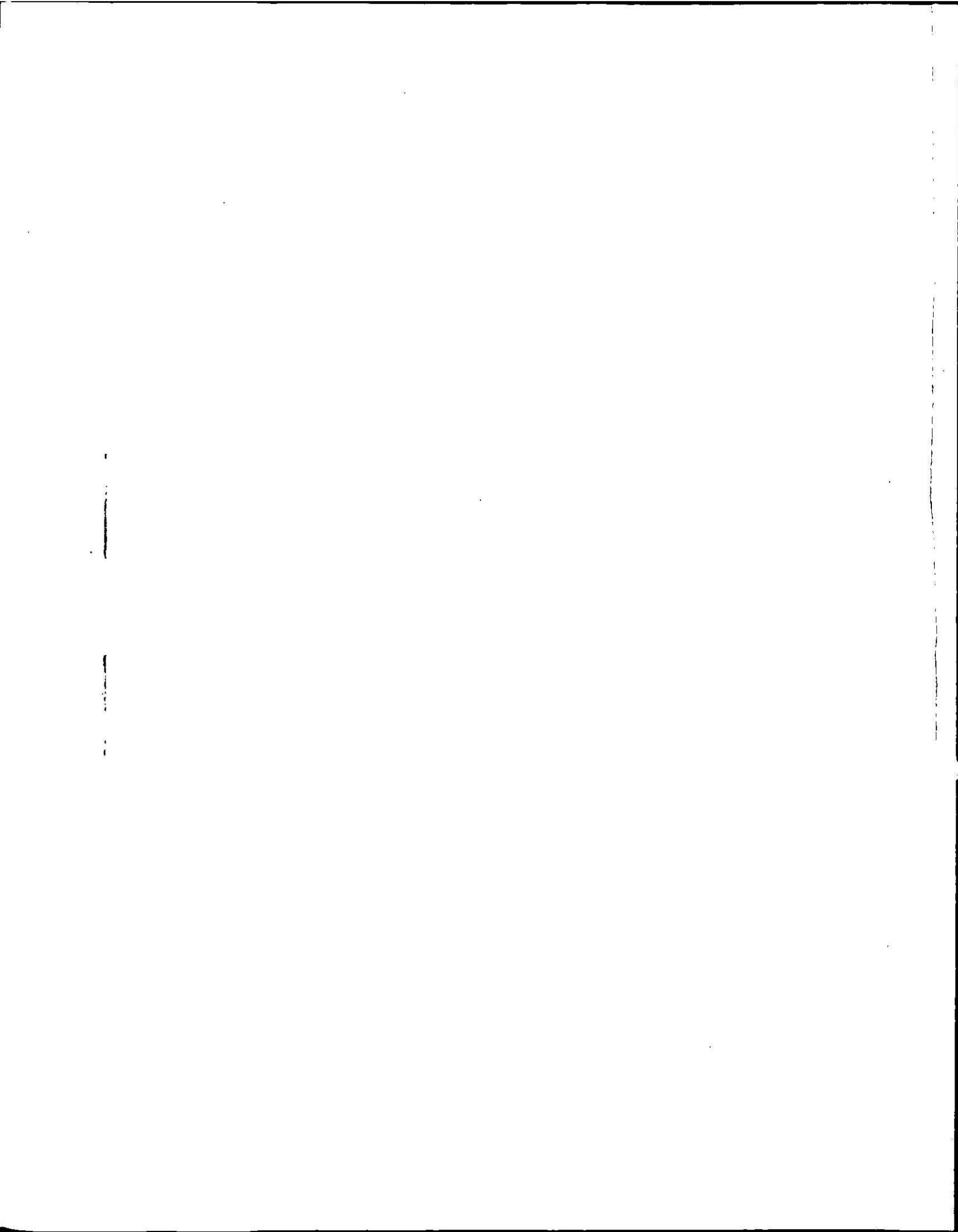

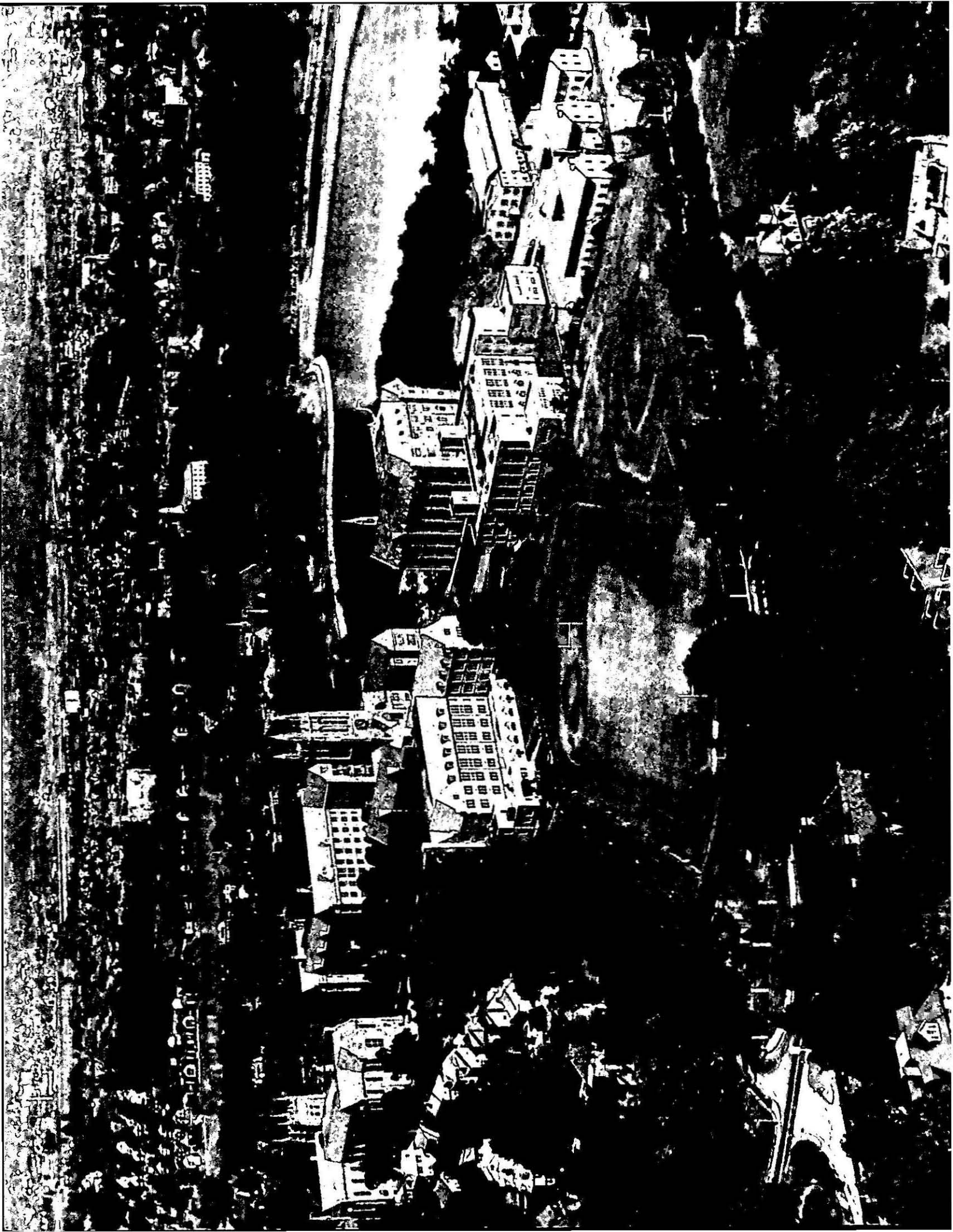

A Brief History of Boston College

Boston College was founded by the Society of Jesus in 1863, and is one of twenty-eight Jesuit colleges and universities in the United States. With three teachers and twenty-two students, the school opened its doors on September 5, 1864. At the outset and for more than seven decades of its first century, the college remained an exclusively liberal arts institution with emphasis on the Greek and Latin classics, English and modern languages and with more attention to philosophy than to the physical or social sciences. Religion of course had its place in the classroom as well as in the nonacademic life of the college.

Originally located on Harrison Avenue in the South End of Boston, where it shared quarters with the Boston College High School, the College outgrew its urban setting toward the end of its first fifty years. A new location was selected in Chestnut Hill, then almost rural, and four parcels of land were acquired in 1907. A design competition for the development of the campus was won by the firm of Maginnis and Walsh, and ground was broken on June 19, 1909, for the construction of Gasson Hall. It is located on the site of the Lawrence farmhouse, in the center of the original tract of land purchased by Father Gasson, and is built largely of stone taken from the surrounding property.

Later purchases doubled the size of the property, with the addition of the upper campus in 1941, and the lower campus with the purchase of the Lawrence Basin and adjoining land in 1949. In 1974 Boston College acquired Newton College of the Sacred Heart, a mile-and-a-half from the main campus. With fifteen buildings standing on forty acres, it is now the site of the Boston College Law School, as well as several academic departments, and dormitories housing over 800 students, primarily freshmen.

Though incorporated as a University since its beginning, it was not until its second half-century that Boston College began to fill out the dimensions of its University charter. The Summer Session was inaugurated in 1924; the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences in 1925; the Law School, 1929; the Evening College, 1929; the Graduate School of Social Work, 1936; the College of Business Administration, 1938. The latter, along with its Graduate School established in 1957, is now known as The Wallace E. Carroll School of Management. The Schools of Nursing and Education were founded in 1947 and 1952, respectively. Weston Observatory, founded in 1928, was accepted as a Department of Boston College in 1947, offering courses in geophysics and geology.

The Graduate School of Arts and Sciences began programs at the doctoral level in 1952. Now courses leading to the doctorate are offered by twelve Arts and Sciences departments plus Education and Nursing. The Carroll Graduate School of Management and the Graduate School of Social Work also offer doctoral programs.

In 1927 Boston College conferred one earned bachelor's degree and fifteen master's degrees on women through the Extension Division, the precursor of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, the Evening College, and the Summer Session. By 1970 all undergraduate programs had become coeducational. Today women students comprise more than half of the University's enrollment.

A Boston College Chronology*

- 1857** Father John McElroy, S.J. purchased property in the South End of Boston for a new college.
- 1860** College building, Jesuit residence and Church of the Immaculate Conception completed.
- 1863** Gov. John A. Andrews signed the charter of Boston College, April 1. First meeting of the Boston College trustees, July 6.
- 1864** Boston College opened on September 5, with Father John Bapst, S.J. as president and Father Robert Fulton, S.J. as dean. Twenty-two students admitted.
- 1877** First Commencement. Nine students received A.B. degrees, June 28.
- 1883** *The Stylus*, the College literary magazine, founded.
- 1895** Boston College and Georgetown debaters held first American Jesuit intercollegiate debate at Boston College.
- 1907** Father Thomas Gasson, S.J. named president; purchased 31 acre Lawrence farm in Chestnut Hill for new campus.
- 1913** Gasson Hall completed. First graduation held at the Heights, June 18. Four classes enrolled in Gasson in September.
- 1918** Conscription and voluntary enlistment for World War I reduced the College enrollment to 125 in October, down from 671 two years earlier.
- 1919** Boston College's first major football victory, 5-3 over favored Yale at New Haven. First issue of *The Heights*, student weekly, November 17.
- 1923** Baseball team beat Holy Cross 4-1 before 30,000 at Braves Field, June 18.
- 1924** Summer School started.
- 1925** Graduate School of Arts and Sciences started.
- 1928** Bapst library opened, the fourth of the early Maginnis and Walsh buildings. Weston Observatory, the seismological station, founded.
- 1929** Law School opened at 11 Beacon St., Boston. Evening College started as "Boston College Intown" at 126 Newbury Street, Boston.
- 1935** Greek requirement for the A.B. degree dropped.
- 1936** Graduate School of Social Work opened at Newbury Street.
- 1938** School of Management opened at Newbury Street as the "College of Business Administration."
- 1940** Cotton Bowl vs. Clemson (3-6) first bowl game.
- 1941** Cardinal O'Connell purchased the Liggett estate, the upper campus, and gave it to the College.
- 1946** To accommodate post war enrollment, army surplus barracks became dormitories on the site of present
Campion Hall; a larger office/classroom building was erected on the site of McGuinn, and a recreation building on the site of Cushing Hall.
- 1947** Construction begun on the first permanent building since the completion of Bapst in 1928, to house the College of Business Administration (occupied in September 1948). The School of Nursing opened at 126 Newbury Street.
- 1949** College acquired small reservoir (lower campus). Hockey team won national title at Colorado Springs.
- 1951** Lyons Hall was completed in July.
- 1952** The School of Education opened in September in Gasson Hall. Doctoral programs were begun in Economics, Education, and History, the beginning of increased emphasis on graduate education.
- 1954** Law School moved to St. Thomas More Hall on the Chestnut Hill campus.
- 1955** Claver, Loyola, and Xavier Halls opened, first campus residences constructed by B.C. The School of Education moved into Campion Hall.
- 1957** Graduate School of Management founded. Alumni Stadium dedicated September 21.
- 1958** Father Michael P. Walsh succeeded Father Joseph R. N. Maxwell as president, February 5. Latin no longer required for the A. B. degree. The College of Arts and Sciences Honors Program and the Scholar of the College program were begun. The original gymnasium, Roberts Center, and the first hockey rink, McHugh Forum, were opened.
- 1959** The Board of Regents, advisory to the trustees and administration, was established.
- 1960** The Nursing School occupied its campus building, Cushing Hall. Three more student residences, named for the early bishops of Boston, Cheverus, Fenwick, and Fitzpatrick, were completed.
- 1961** McElroy Commons opened.
- 1963** The Boston College Centennial Convocation was addressed by President John F. Kennedy on April 20. The Self-Study of the College of Arts and Sciences led to a new core curriculum, a reduction in the course load, election of department chairmen, the establishment of Educational Policy committees, and sabbaticals.
- 1964** Carney Hall opened. Welch, Williams, and Roncalli residences were occupied.
- 1966** Higgins Hall was dedicated in November.
- 1968** Father W. Seavey Joyce succeeded Father Michael P. Walsh as president, July 1. The Regents joined the Jesuit trustees to form the Board of Directors, October 8. The Black Talent Program was started, precursor to AHANA Student Programs.

- 1970** Women admitted for degrees in all undergraduate colleges (Sept.). The modular residences were placed on the lower campus. Pulse, an academic/social action program, was started. The Campus School for multi-handicapped children was begun.
- 1971** The office of president of Boston College and rector of the Boston College Jesuit community were separated on January 1. Installation of Omicron Chapter, Phi Beta Kappa, April 6.
- 1972** Father J. Donald Monan succeeded Father Joyce as president, September 5. The trustees voted to eliminate the Board of Directors and to expand the Board of Trustees to include laymen, November 19. The newly structured Board of Trustees, with 35 members (13 Jesuits), elected Cornelius Owens '36 chairman. The Women's Center was established.
- 1973** The Long-Range Fiscal Planning Committee presented to the Trustees a plan for balanced budgets for the succeeding five years.
- 1974** Newton College of the Sacred Heart became part of Boston College. The announcement was made on March 11.
- 1975** The Law School moved to the Newton Campus. Edmond's Hall was occupied in September.
- 1976** The New Heights Advancement Campaign to raise \$21 million over five years was begun in April. By 1981 it raised more than \$25 million.
- 1979** 1,000 friends of Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill gathered in Washington for a dinner attended by President Carter to establish the O'Neill Chair in American Politics, December 9. The Graduate School of Social Work established a doctoral degree program. The Recreation Complex named for Athletic Director, William J. Flynn.
- 1980** The Jesuit community endowed the Thomas I. Gasson, S.J. Chair for distinguished Jesuit scholars.
- 1982** Walsh Hall residence dedicated to former president Michael P. Walsh, S.J., October 7.
- 1984** O'Neill Library dedicated to Speaker of the House Thomas P. O'Neill, '36, October 14. Doug Flutie awarded Heisman Trophy.
- 1985** Football team defeated Houston (45-28) in the Cotton Bowl, January 1. The E. Paul Robsham, Jr. Theater Arts Center was dedicated on October 25.
- 1986** Rededication of renovated Bapst Library, dedication of Burns Library, April 22. McHugh Forum demolished to make way for new sports complex. Hall of Fame Bowl victory over Georgia (27-24). *Goals for Nineties* (planning document) published. Alumni Association moved to Alumni House (then called Putnam House) on the Newton Campus to make room for the Commonwealth Avenue student residences. St. Patrick's Day dinner in Washington honoring Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill. Speakers included President Reagan, former President Gerald Ford, and Bob Hope. \$2 million was raised for B.C. scholarships. Five year \$125 million Campaign for Boston College started. The dismantling of McHugh Forum was begun to make way for Conte Forum.
- 1987** The Carroll Graduate School of Management's doctoral program in finance was approved by the Trustees. The Jesuit Institute, funded by a \$1.5 million gift from the Jesuit community, with a matching University subsidy, was founded to promote research on the religious and Jesuit traditions of Boston College. Father Monan established a standing Council on the Catholic and Jesuit Identity of Boston College. Celebration of the acquisition of the millionth volume by the libraries, September 22.
- 1988** The first students enrolled in the new Nursing doctoral program. The Music Program became a department of the College of Arts and Sciences. Vouté Hall and its companion student residence on Commonwealth Avenue were occupied. The Museum of Art (then called the art gallery) was opened in Devlin Hall. Boston College defeated Army in the first American collegiate football game played in Dublin, Ireland, November 19. Father Peter-Hans Kolvenbach, Superior General of the Society of Jesus spoke at celebrations of the University's 125th anniversary, October 5 and 7.
- 1989** Congressman Silvio O. Conte '49 was present for the dedication of Conte Forum on February 18. The School of Management became the Carroll School of Management and the Carroll Graduate School of Management in honor of Wallace E. Carroll '28. Sister Thea Bowman was awarded an honorary degree and AHANA House was named for her in October. Roberts Center was razed to make room for the Chemistry building.
- 1991** New Core Curriculum adopted. Wing added to Champion Hall, with major renovation of the original building. New Chemistry building on Beacon Street opened. Successful completion of \$125 million Campaign for Boston College.

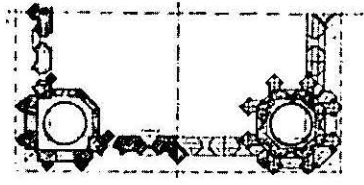

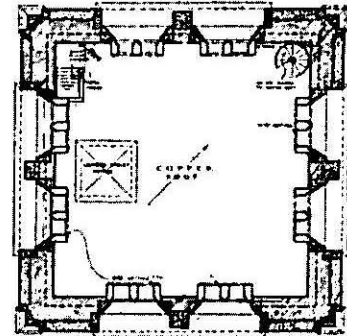
RECITATION BUILDING OF BOSTON COLLEGE AT UNIVERSITY HEIGHTS

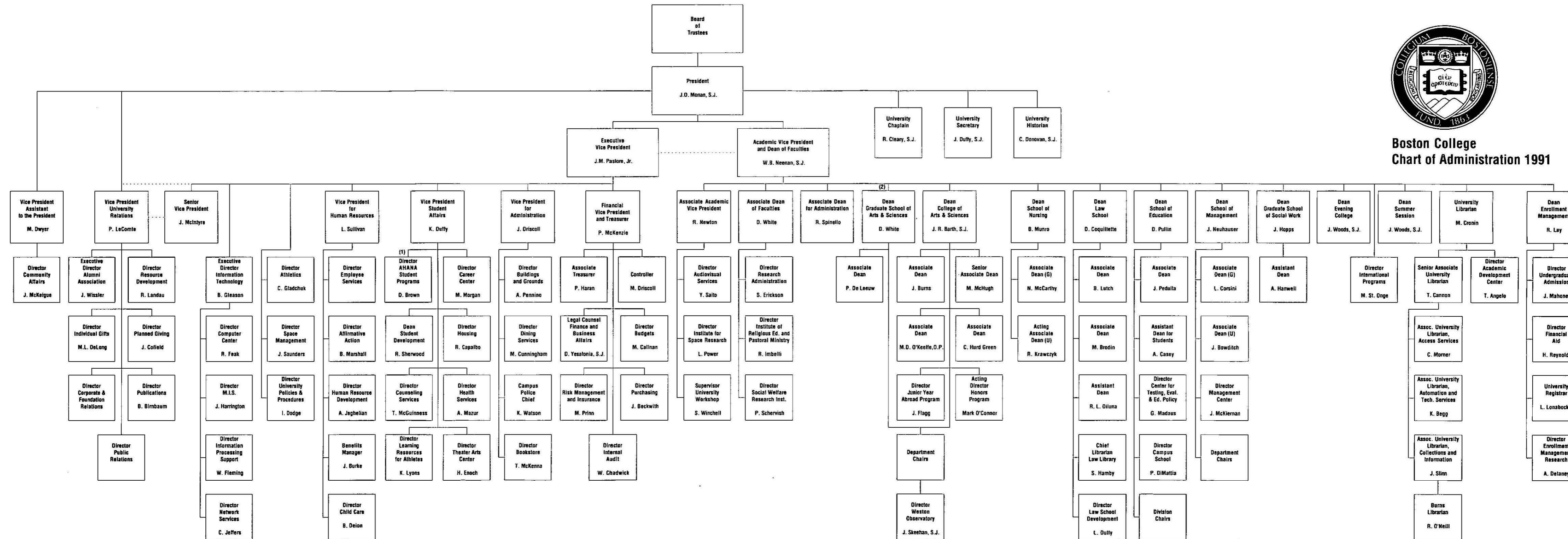

Special Library Services

Quest – Library Information System

The Quest Computer system of the Boston College Libraries provides access to 1.2 million volumes including books, media materials, microforms, newspapers and periodicals. Quest may be searched by author, title, subject or key word from terminals in the libraries or by dialing in to the system from other locations on campus. Also, major periodical indexes in the humanities, social sciences and the sciences may be searched by selecting the QWIL database when using the system.

Computer Searching

A state of the art CD-ROM network in the O'Neill Library gives patrons immediate on-site access to many important and high use databases in the fields of education, psychology, business, the social sciences, nursing and medicine, and public affairs. Dial-in access to this network is planned from other campus libraries. Additional CD-ROM databases are available on individual workstations in the O'Neill Library. New databases are added regularly and patrons should check with the Reference Department for a list of current titles.

In addition to the search capabilities available through Quest and CD-ROM, the Libraries offer patrons and researchers access to several hundred on-line databases that may be used for the retrieval of bibliographic information, text, and statistical information. To use these databases, a researcher may plan a search strategy with a reference librarian and have the librarian perform the search, or the researcher may choose from among a smaller number of on-line services, such as Dow Jones or BRS/After Dark, and, after training, perform the search himself/herself for a lesser fee. The Law School Library has on-line access to LEXIS and WESTLAW as well as other databases. Access to some of these files may be limited by contract to members of the Law School community.

The Libraries also facilitate access to many computerized databases in business, economics, and the social sciences on magnetic tape. The tapes are purchased by the Libraries and are housed in the University computing facility.

Contact the Reference Department for more information, and to arrange for demonstrations, workshops, or presentations to classes or departments.

Interlibrary Loan

The Interlibrary Loan Service is offered to students, faculty, administrators, and staff to facilitate obtaining materials not available in the Boston College Libraries. Books, photocopies of journal articles, microfilm, theses, and government documents may be borrowed from other libraries. Except for unusual items, the waiting period is

from one to four weeks; for anyone willing to use the material at the holding library, a computerized system at the reference desk will provide locations. Request forms and further information are available from the Interlibrary Loan staff in each library.

Boston Library Consortium

The library is a member of the Boston Library Consortium, a group of area libraries which includes Brandeis, Boston University, Tufts, Wellesley, Northeastern, MIT, Massachusetts State Library, Boston Public Library, and the University of Massachusetts System. Faculty and graduate students may apply for a Consortium borrower's card at the Reference Department in the O'Neill Library. The Consortium maintains a central office at the Boston Public Library. Further information may be found in the User Guide and the Consortium Handbook, available in all libraries.

United States Government Publications

In 1964, Boston College was designated as one of the Federal Depository Libraries for this congressional district. This status entitles the O'Neill Library to receive, on a selective basis, United States government publications at no cost with the stipulation that they be made available to the general public. Most of the material circulates in the same manner as books. Inquiries related to the use of government documents should be directed to the Government Documents Department on the first floor of the O'Neill Library.

Media Department

The Media Department on the second floor of the O'Neill Library houses information in many formats — videocassettes, videodiscs, 16mm films, phonodiscs, audiocassettes, compact discs, sound filmstrips, and slides. All materials may be used by patrons in individual carrels or, when accompanied by a faculty member, in meeting rooms. Loans are restricted to BC faculty members and librarians. The Department collects nonprint materials in all subject areas within the University's teaching and research interests. The Vision Resources area within the Department has adaptive computer hardware and software for students with vision impairments.

New England Library Information Network/OCLC

Through membership in the New England Library Information Network (NELINET), our users have on-line access to publishing, cataloging, and interlibrary loan location information from the data bank of OCLC, Inc. which contains over 18 million bibliographic records from the Library of Congress and from 4,000 other libraries in North America.

John J. Burns Library of Rare Books and Special Collections

The University's special collections, including the University's Archives, are housed in the magnificently appointed John J. Burns Library, located in the Bapst Library Building, north entrance. The distinguished and varied collections of the Honorable John J. Burns Library speak eloquently of the University's commitment to the preservation and dissemination of human knowledge. The Burns Library is home to nearly one hundred thousand volumes, more than three million manuscripts, and important collections of architectural records, maps, art works, photographs, films, artifacts, and ephemera. These materials are housed in the climate-controlled, secure environment of Burns either because of their rarity or because of their importance as part of a special collection. While treated with special care, these resources are available for use at Burns to all qualified students, faculty, and researchers. Indeed, their use is strongly encouraged, and visitors to Burns are always welcome, either simply to browse or to make use of the collections.

Though its collections cover virtually the entire spectrum of human knowledge, the Burns Library has achieved international recognition in several specific areas of research, most notably: Irish studies; British Catholic authors; Jesuitana; fine print; Catholic liturgy and life in America, 1925-1975; Boston history; Caribbeana; and Congressional archives. It has also won acclaim for significant holdings on nursing, detective fiction, Thomas Merton, Japanese prints, Colonial and early Republic Protestantism, and banking.

The new Academic Development Center (ADC) is designed to support and enhance all aspects of academic excellence — Boston College's number one priority for the 1990's — by helping undergraduates, graduate students, and faculty improve learning quality and teaching effectiveness. The ADC, which opened its doors in September 1991, is located on the second floor of O'Neill Library in the Eileen M. and John J. Connors, Jr. Learning Center.

The ADC is a comprehensive, inclusive resource serving all of the University's students and faculty. To address the needs of the great majority of Boston College students, the Center provides tutoring and supplemental instruction in courses such as calculus, statistics, biology, chemistry, physics, nursing, accounting, and classical and foreign languages — along with training workshops in useful study skills and learning strategies. Graduate tutors in English help students strengthen their writing skills. (All ADC tutors are recommended and certified by their relevant academic departments; most are graduate students or outstanding seniors.)

The Center offers programs designed to challenge the most academically talented, highest achieving students — as well as programs designed to support those who are least prepared and most academically challenged. One member of the ADC's professional staff serves the needs of special populations, particularly those students with learning disabilities, helping to ensure their academic success at Boston College.

The Center also sponsors seminars, workshops, and discussions for faculty and graduate teaching fellows on strategies for successful teaching and learning. Through these and other activities, the new Academic Development Center will play an increasingly important role in enhancing the quality of teaching and learning at Boston College.

University Archives

Archives are the official noncurrent papers and records of an institution that are deemed worthy of preservation for their legal, fiscal, or historical values. The University Archives contain the office records and documents of the various University offices, academic and otherwise, copies of all University publications, including student publications, movie footage of Boston College football, some audiovisual materials, and tape recordings of the University Lecture Series and other significant events. A significant collection of photographs documents the pictorial history of Boston College. Alumni, faculty, and Jesuit records are also preserved. In addition, the Archives are the repository for the documents of Newton College of the Sacred Heart (1946–1975); The Jesuit Education Association (1934–1970); the Catholic International Education Office (1952–1976); and the documents of the Jesuit Community of Boston College (1863–).

The Language Laboratory

The Language Laboratory, serving all the language departments, English for Foreign Students, and the Boston College community at large, is located in Lyons 313. In addition to its state-of-the-art listening/recording stations and dual-teacher console, the facility includes video and film viewing rooms, microcomputers, and a short-wave radio. The Lab's audio and videotape collection, computer software, and other audiovisual learning aids directly support and/or supplement the curriculum requirements in foreign language, foreign literature, and foreign music. Lab materials are designed to assist users in the acquisition and maintenance of aural comprehension, oral and written proficiency, and cultural awareness. Prominent among the Lab's holdings are SCOLA (Satellite Communications for Learning) international news broadcasts. These live or near-live news broadcasts in Chinese, French, German, Greek, Italian, Japanese, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish and other languages are received via satellite at Boston College, videotaped by the Audiovisual Department, and stored and viewed in the Language Lab. The Language Laboratory Director and student lab assistants are available during the day and evening to assist students (undergraduate and graduate) and faculty in the operation of equipment and selection of appropriate materials for their course-related or personal language needs.

Information Processing Support

The department of Information Processing Support (IPS) provides computing and communications support services to the Boston College community. Among the multitude of service and support functions that IPS offers, the three most significant areas are the Workstation program; the Training program; and basic Consulting services. The Workstation program organizes the distribution of microcomputers and terminals to faculty and staff throughout the university. It is responsible for soliciting workstation requests, determining user needs, designing workstation configurations, ordering systems, and scheduling distribution. The Training program offers more than 100 different classes each year on a wide variety of applications and topics. IPS Consulting services provide advisement, consulting, and problem resolution services to Boston College faculty, staff, and students. The following tables present a cumulative summary of the number of workstations (microcomputers and terminals) owned by the university; the number of people attending IPS training classes annually; and the annual number of user requests for assistance received by IPS staff.

Management Information Systems

The department of Management Information Systems (MIS) develops and maintains the University's information systems. Each year MIS receives nearly 1,000 requests for changes or enhancements to existing programs and development of new systems. The time needed to complete these changes, enhancements, and new systems can range from two hours to many months. The Boston College information systems environment is dynamic, complex, and constantly open to change. Users of CICS (IBM's Customer Information Control System), across the university, access over 1,900 different screen formats in the on-line production system. Each night more than 195 scheduled computer jobs plus special requests are run in "batch" producing grade reports, paychecks, registration forms, bills, labels, and other vital documents. The table below presents a summary of selected performance statistics for fiscal years 1987-88, 1989-90, and 1990-91.

Network Services

The Network Services department is responsible for the installation, repair, and troubleshooting of all voice and data communication networks on the various campuses of the university. The table below presents a summary of the work accomplished by Network Services during fiscal years 1989-90 and 1990-91. Several significant projects were accomplished this last year. The large proportion of project time allocated to the academic area (see below, right) reflects in part the effort devoted to networking Carney Hall and the Law School. The significant increase in project time allocated to information technology this past year is primarily a result of the engineering studies made to determine how to protect campus communication networks from lightning damage.

Computer Center

The Boston College Computer Center is responsible for the operation and support of the IBM and Digital mainframe computers, located on the fifth floor of the O'Neill Library. The Operations department of the Computer Center maintains a twenty-four hour per day, seven day per week operations schedule in support of academic and administrative computing and printing needs. The IBM and Vax Systems Programming Staff is responsible for the installation, maintenance, and support of the operating systems software, and for hardware problem detection and reporting. Support is also provided for the activities of Management Information Systems, Network Services, and Information Processing Support, as well as limited support directly to mainframe computing users.

ATHLETICS

Boston College Names Chet Gladchuk, Jr. Director of Intercollegiate Athletics

President J. Donald Monan, S.J. announced the appointment of Chet S. Gladchuk, Jr. as the University's new Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on December 10, 1990. Gladchuk, 40, a 1973 Boston College graduate who had been Director of Athletics at Tulane University, succeeds William J. Flynn who retired after serving as Boston College's athletic director since 1957.

In announcing Gladchuk's appointment, Father Monan said: "Against a field of candidates who will be the next decade's outstanding athletic directors, Chet Gladchuk has become the clear choice to lead Boston College's athletic programs. Chet has brilliantly successful experience in each of the challenging responsibilities of the position. He resonates with Boston College's standards of accomplishments in both academics and on the playing field and he has the experience and imagination to bring those standards to a new level of fulfillment. His direction of the athletic program of a distinguished AAU University has won the admiration and affection of all who know him in New Orleans."

Gladchuk served as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics and Assistant to the Chancellor at Tulane from April 1988 through December 1990. In that time he successfully headed a \$25 million capital campaign for Tulane athletics, and planned and implemented construction of a 76,000 square foot athletic center, baseball stadium, track and tennis complex, and the renovation of the school's basketball arena. His reorganization of Tulane's athletic department resulted in a \$1 million savings while providing additional personnel and services for student-athletes. His tenure also saw the reinstatement of Tulane's Division I basketball program which had been suspended in 1985.

Chet was Associate Director of Athletics at Syracuse University from 1985 to 1988. His duties there included operations management, NCAA policy enforcement, financial aid administration, and computer operations. From 1978 through 1985, Chet was employed at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst where he was Assistant Department Head, Assistant Director of Athletics, Director of General Physical Education, and Director of Summer Sports Camps Programs. He also coached the UMass women's softball team to an undefeated regular season and the New England championship. Chet began his administrative career as Director of Athletics and Physical Education and Head Football Coach at New Hampton Prep School in New Hampton, New Hampshire from 1974 to 1978.



A native of Amherst, Massachusetts, Chet was a scholarship football player at Boston College (1969-73), and also a Dean's List student in business management. He was a recipient of the "Unsung Hero" football award given by the New England Football Writers' Association in 1972 and also won the 1972 Tim Mara Scholarship Award presented by the New York Football Giants. He obtained his master's degree in sports administration from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst in 1974.

Chet has been active in numerous civic activities in both Syracuse and New Orleans, and was awarded the Governor's Certificate of Merit for his service and dedication to Louisiana sports. In 1989 he was presented with the Mayor's Award for outstanding contributions to the City of New Orleans.

Intercollegiate Athletic Accomplishments 1990-1991

Men's Baseball

Third year coach Moe Maloney's team finished with a record of 20-14, earning their first ever Big East Tournament berth. In addition, Brian Looney, Doug MacNeil, and Brian Kelley were all named to the All-Big East Team.

Men's Basketball

Coach Jim O'Brien's team had a difficult season, finishing 11-19, but the season was brightened by their big win over Maryland in the ACC-Big East Challenge. Freshman Bill Curley, named Big East Rookie of the Year, will be the key man on the court for the Eagles.

Women's Basketball

Coach Margo Plotzke's Lady Eagles finished with a record of 12-16 coming off a grueling schedule with a young team. The 90-91 season saw senior Carla Wenger score her 1000th point against Northern Illinois, and sophomore Sarah Behn score her 1000th point against Villanova. As the ninth woman ever to score 1000 points at Boston College, Behn will surely set prestigious records during her next two seasons.

Men's Cross-Country

Coach Randy Thomas's squad had a very successful season, taking the Greater Boston Championships, placing second in the National Catholic Championships, and third in the New Englands. Senior Dermot Fitzpatrick earned Greater Boston Champion.

Women's Cross-Country

Randy Thomas' women's squad was likewise very successful, capturing the National Catholic and Greater Boston Championships, and taking second in the New Englands. Senior Jennifer Rolfe went to the NCAAs, the first Eagle to do so in eight years.

Field Hockey

Coach Sherren Granese came away from a difficult season with a record of 4-15-0. Leading scorer Joelle Kozman was named the Boston 4 All-Star and Margaret Walsh was named Boston 4 Rookie of the Year.

Football

Coach Jack Bicknell's Eagles finished with a 4-7 record in 1990. The Eagles' home game against Penn State was televised nationally by CBS Sports. First-year quarterback Glenn Foley passed for 2,189 yards, a new freshman record at the school.

Men's Golf

Coach Ed Carroll's golfers had a very successful season, led by two standouts on last year's squad. Peter Keller became the first Boston College golfer to win the New England Championship in nearly 40 years. In addition, Keller was the Big East champion and was named to the All-New England First Team. Dan Mulkern was named to the All-New England Second Team, as well as chosen for the Big East All-Academic Squad.

Women's Golf

Coach Bobbi Carson led her golfers to a 10th place finish at the ECAC Championships and defeated the perennial power and rival Princeton for the first time.

Hockey

Coach Len Ceglarski had an outstanding season, winning the Hockey East regular season championship for the sixth time, with a final record of 27-12-0. Captain David Emma had a stellar year, becoming the first Eagle to win the Hobey Baker Award as the premier hockey player in the country.

Men's Lacrosse

Coach Ed Moy's team improved in the 90-91 season, finishing with a 6-8-0 record. Standout Mark Gaffney was one of the top scorers in the country, netting 43 goals in 14 games.

Women's Lacrosse

Coach Sherren Granese's squad finished with a 6-7 record. The team was led by tri-captain Lexy Denney who scored 32 goals in 13 games and earned a spot in the North/South All-Star Game.

Sailing

Coach Norm Reid's men and women sailors had a successful season, competing in the prestigious Kennedy Cup at Navy for the first time. In addition, the women were ranked 11th nationally and won four trophy regattas.

Men's Skiing

Finishing ninth nationally, Coach Bill Toof's skiers had another outstanding year, capturing the Eastern Collegiate Ski Conference title. In addition, senior Jim Bianchi was the ECSC individual champion.

Women's Skiing

Bill Toof's women's team had an excellent season, winning the Eastern Regional Championships. Standout on last year's team, Kristen Mohill won the Triple Crown in slalom, giant slalom, and combined.

Men's Soccer

Coach Ed Kelly continued to improve the men's team, coaching them to a record of 14-5-2 and the Big East Championship. The victory advanced them to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1982.

Women's Soccer

Under new head coach Therese Bonorden, the women had a tough transitional year but finished 6-2-2 in their last 10 games. Highlight of the season was the Eagles' victory over UConn, the number two team in the country.

Women's Softball

Coach Nancy McGuire's Eagles finished a great season with a 14-6 record and took second place in the Big East Tournament.

Men's Swimming and Diving

Coached by Tom Groden, the Eagles swam to a second place finish in the New Englands. Compiling a 7-3 record, the men also finished fifth in the National Catholics and fifth in the Big East.

Women's Swimming and Diving

Coach Tom Groden's women swimmers had an excellent season, finishing with a fine 10-2 record. They were the New England Champions, placed third at the National Catholics, and finished fourth in the Big East.

Men's Tennis

Coach Mark Burns led his team to their 10th Big East title in 11 years.

Women's Tennis

Coaching the women as well, Burns' Eagles captured their sixth Big East title.

Men's Track and Field

Coach Karen Keith-Dobbs' strong squad captured third place in the Greater Boston Outdoor Meet and fourth place in the New England Indoor Meet.

Women's Track and Field

Coach Keith-Dobbs led her Eagles to a second place finish in the Greater Boston Outdoor Meet and a fourth place finish in the Greater Boston Indoor Meet.

Women's Volleyball

In his sixth season, coach Gary Gildea led the court Eagles to an overall record of 15-20. Against a tough field of opponents, BC finished fourth in the Big East regular season standings.

Women's Water Polo

Under coach Jerry Moss, the Eagles had an outstanding season in only their second year as a varsity team. They finished fourth in the New England Championships behind three top 20 teams.

Wrestling

Coach Rod Buttry's grapplers captured fourth place at the National Catholic Championships, highlighting a successful season.

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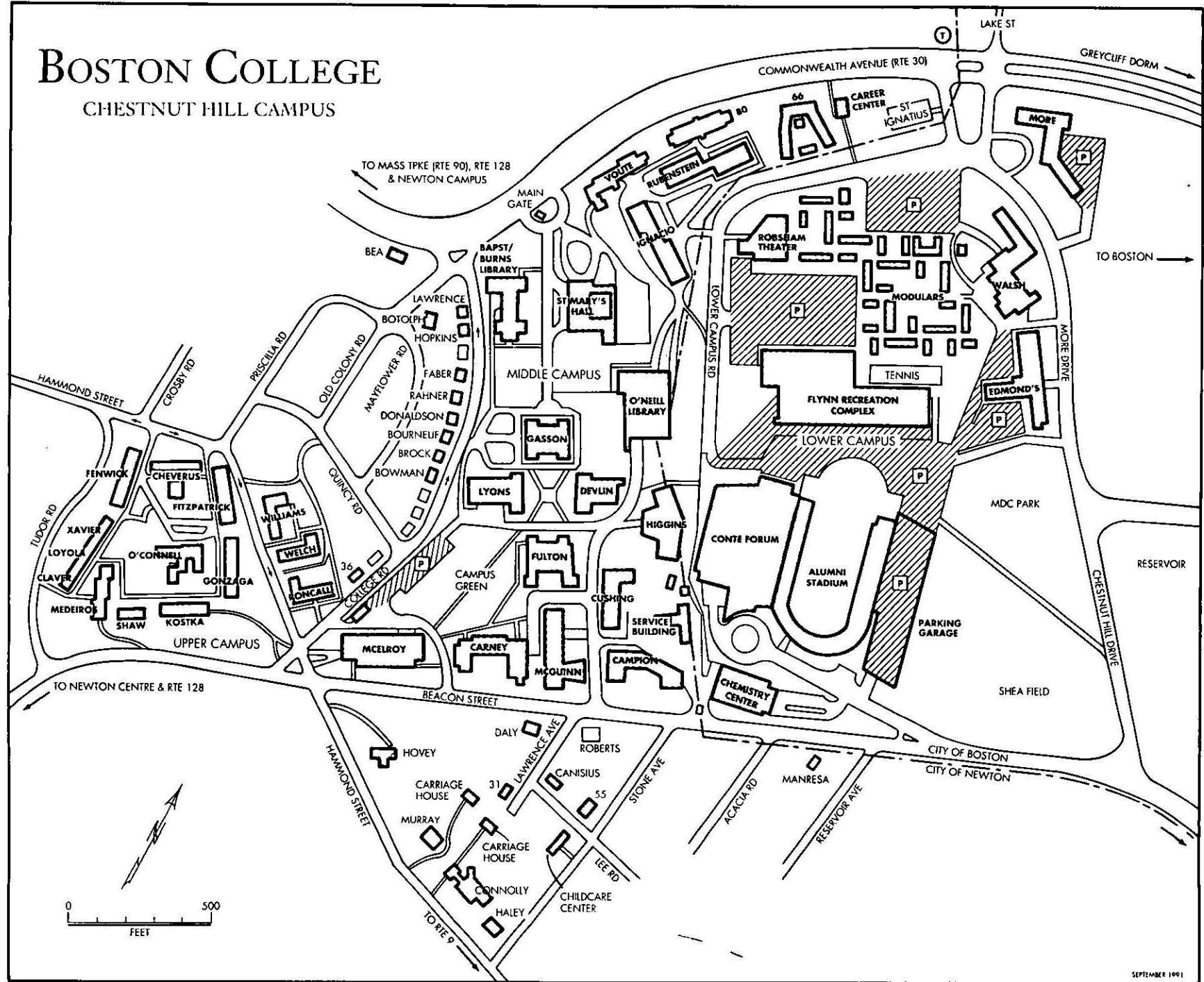
