Angela Ards, Boston College Democracy, Governance, and Education working group

Associate Professor of English and African & African Diaspora Studies and Director of the Journalism Program at Boston College. She teaches African American and contemporary American literature, focusing on cultural studies, literary journalism, and narratives of place. She holds a Ph.D. and M.A. in English from Princeton University, an M.A. in Afro-American Studies from UCLA, and her B.A. in English and Afro-American Studies at UNC Chapel Hill.

Chris Higgins, Boston College

Democracy, Governance, and Education working group

Associate Professor and Chair of the Formative Education Dept. in the Lynch School of Education and Human Development at Boston College. A philosopher of education, he seeks to articulate the existential dimensions of teaching and learning, to defend the idea of education as a public good, and to recall education to its humane roots. He holds a Ph.D. in Philosophy and Education from Columbia University and a B.A. in Philosophy from Yale University.

Linda Hogan, Trinity College Dublin

Democracy, Governance, and Education working group

Professor of Ecumenics in the School of Religion at Trinity College Dublin, where she also served as Vice-Provost, Chief Academic Officer, and Deputy President from 2011-2016. Her primary interests are in inter-religious ethics, social and political ethics, human rights, and gender. She holds a Ph.D. in Theology from Trinity College Dublin, and an M.A. and B.A. from Maynooth University.

Vidya Ann Jacob, Christ University

Climate Change and Migration working group (Guest participant)

Assistant Professor of Law at Christ University in Bangalore. Her research focuses on environmental law and policy, human rights, and urban development law. A recipient of a Fulbright-Kalam Climate Fellowship to study U.S. laws on climate resilience, her research has also been supported by the Karnataka Government. She holds a Ph.D. from the National Law School of India University, Bangalore, an LL.M from Christ University, and a B.A.LL.B. from Bangalore University.

Cathleen Kaveny, Boston College

Democracy, Governance, and Education working group

Darald and Juliet Libby Millennium Professor in the Theology Dept. and Law School at Boston College. Her research and teaching focus on the relationship between law, religion, and morality, including social ethics and medical ethics. A former clerk for Hon. John T. Noonan Jr. of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, she received her J.D. and Ph.D. from Yale University, and an A.B. from Princeton University.













James F. Keenan, S.J., Boston College

Principal Investigator, Program on Global Ethics & Social Trust

Vice Provost for Global Engagement, Canisius Professor of Theology, and Director of the Jesuit Institute at Boston College. Founder of the global network Catholic Theological Ethics in the World Church, he is past president of the Society of Christian Ethics. He holds doctoral and licentiate degrees from Gregorian University in Rome, an M.Div. from Weston Jesuit School of Theology, and an A.B. from Fordham University.

Juan Larraín, Pontifical Catholic University of Chile

Democracy, Governance, and Education working group (Guest participant)

Professor of Biological Sciences and Director of the Institute of Applied Ethics at the Pontifical Catholic University of Chile, where he previously served as Vice Rector. Currently, he researches applied ethics, focusing on animal ethics and the epistemology of virtue in research. He received his Ph.D in Biology and M.A. in Philosophy, Science, and Religion at UC Chile.

Jonathan Laurence, Boston College

Democracy, Governance, and Education working group (Chair)

Professor of Political Science and Director of the Clough Center for Constitutional Democracy at Boston College. His primary areas of teaching and research are comparative politics and the intersection of religion and politics in Western Europe, Turkey, and North Africa. He received his Ph.D. and M.A. in government from Harvard University, and his B.A. from Cornell University.

Maryanne Loughry, Boston College

Climate Change and Migration working group

A Sister of Mercy, she works with and for refugees worldwide. At Boston College Loughry teaches in the School of Social Work and serves as a senior advisor to the Vice Provost for Global Engagement. At Oxford University's Refugee Studies Centre, she researches psychosocial effects of refugee displacement. She also serves as Associate Director of Jesuit Refugee Service Australia. Her Ph.D is from Flinders University of South Australia.

Anne McDonald, Sophia University

Climate Change and Migration working group

Professor of Global Environmental Studies and Director of the Island Sustainability Institute at Sophia University in Tokyo. Former Director of the UN University Institute of Advanced Studies, she works with local, national, and international policymakers at the IPCC, United Nations, and nation-states across the Pacific to link research to policy development. She attended Kumamoto University in Japan and graduated from the University of British Columbia.

Oscar Melo, Pontifical Catholic University of Chile

Climate Change and Migration working group

Associate Professor of Agricultural and Resource Economics in the School of Agronomy and Forest Engineering at the Pontifical Catholic University of Chile, in Santiago. His research focuses on environmental valuation, climate change, land use, agriculture. and the water-energy-land nexus. He received a Ph.D. and M.Sc. in Agricultural and Resource Economics from University of Maryland, and a B.A. in agronomy at Catholic University of Chile.













Elias Omondi Opongo, S.J., Hekima College

Democracy, Governance, and Education working group

Senior Lecturer at the Hekima University Institute of Peace Studies and International Relations, in Nairobi, Kenya. He is a peace practitioner with a focus on conflict resolution, reconciliation, community peacebuilding, humanitarian assistance, transitional justice, post-conflict reconstruction, and state-building. He received a Ph.D. in Peace and Conflict Studies from University of Bradford (UK) and an M.A. in International Peace Studies from University of Notre Dame.

Erik Owens, Boston College

Director, Program on Global Ethics and Social Trust

Director of the International Studies Program, Professor of the Practice in Theology, and affiliate faculty in the Formative Education Department at Boston College. His research and teaching explore intersections between religion and public life, with a focus on citizenship in global contexts and the challenge of fostering the common good in religiously diverse societies. He received his Ph.D. in religious ethics from the University of Chicago, an M.T.S. from Harvard Divinity School, and a B.A. from Duke University.

Nelson Ribeiro, Catholic University of Portugal Democracy, Governance, and Education working group

Associate Professor and Dean of the Faculty of Human Sciences at the Catholic University of Portugal, and coordinator of the doctoral program in Communication Studies. Ribiero is a scholar of media history, propaganda and disinformation, media and colonialism, and journalism studies. He received his Ph.D in Communication and Culture Studies from the University of Lincoln (UK).

Francisco de Roux, S.J., Javeriana University

Democracy, Governance, and Education working group

Economist, philosopher, and chair of Colombia's Commission for the Clarification of Truth, Coexistence and Non-Repetition, which investigated human rights violations and shed light on the causes and origins of the country's 50-year civil conflict. Fr. De Roux has been honored with the Sakharov Prize, among other awards, for his work. He received his Ph.D. in Economics at the University of Paris-Sorbonne, an M.A from the London School of Economics, and his B.A. in philosophy and theology at Javeriana University, Bogota.

Jessie Saeli, Boston College

Staff Assistant, Program on Global Ethics and Social Trust

Staff assistant for the GEST Program, and previously an assistant at the BC Office of Global Engagement. Saeli is a Religion and Media Fellow at the Center for Mind and Culture, where she writes articles for a general audience on religious demography and the cognitive science of religion. She received her M.A. in Philosophy at Boston College, and a B.A. from the University of Notre Dame.

Noah Snyder, Boston College

Climate Change and Migration working group

Professor and Chair in the Dept. of Earth and Environmental Sciences, and former Director of the Environmental Studies Program at Boston College. His research focuses on river ecology and restoration using fluvial geomorphology, field-based measurements, and remote sensing to measure the short- and longterm responses of rivers to change. His research has been funded by the National Science Foundation, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and the Harvard Forest. He holds a Ph.D. in geology from MIT and a B.A. from Bates College.











Martin Summers, Boston College

Democracy, Governance, and Education working group

Professor of History and former Director of the African and African Diaspora Studies Program at Boston College. A faculty affiliate of the Medical Humanities, Health, and Culture Program and the Women's and Gender Studies Program, he is a cultural historian of 19th and 20th century United States, focusing on race, gender, sexuality, and medicine. He received a Ph.D. in U.S. History from Rutgers University and a B. A. in Social Sciences Education from Hampton University.

Hanqin Tian, Boston College

Climate Change and Migration working group

Schiller Institute Professor of Global Sustainability and Professor of Earth and Environmental Sciences at Boston College. His research and teaching focus on climate and sustainability sciences, following a data-driven systems approach to understanding, quantifying, and predicting drivers and effects of global-scale changes in the biosphere, climate, and human activity. He received his Ph.D. in Environmental Biology from SUNY-ESF and Syracuse University, an M.S. from the Chinese Academy of Agricultural Sciences, and a B.S. from Zhejiang University.

Daisy Vazquez, Porticus

Daisy Vazquez is a New York-based Program Manager at Porticus, the Amsterdam-based global foundation that works to ensure peace, health, and justice for communities around the world. At Porticus North America she collaborates with partners across the U.S. and Canada on initiatives promoting human flourishing and dignity. She received her B.A. from Hunter College.


Andrea Vicini, S.J., Boston College Climate Change and Migration working group

Michael P. Walsh Professor of Bioethics and Chair of the Theology Dept. at Boston College. Fr. Vicini is co-chair of Catholic Theological Ethics in the World Church, and a Fellow of the Collegium Ramazzini. His research and teaching interests include biotechnologies, bioethics, environmental issues, global public health, sustainability, and fundamental theological ethics. A pediatrician, he earned his M.D. from University of Bologna, a Ph.D in theological ethics from Boston College, and additional sacred and academic degrees from Gregorian University (Rome), Centre Sèvres (Paris), Weston Jesuit School of Theology (Cambridge, MA), and the Aloisianum Institute (Padova, Italy).

Katharine Young, Boston College Climate Change and Migration working group (Chair)

Professor of Law, Associate Dean for Faculty and Global Programs, and Dean's Distinguished Scholar at the Boston College Law School. Her research focuses on comparative constitutional law, international human rights law, economic and social rights, and law and gender. She has clerked for the Australian High Court, and held fellowships at Harvard University's Safra Center for Ethics and Weatherhead Center for International Affairs. She received her LL.M. and S.J.D. from Harvard University, and her B.A. and LL.B. from University of Melbourne.
