

Supplies will be provided to you.



"On Sunday, March 30, 2025, MakeBC hosted its annual Make-a-Thon, co-sponsored by the Schiller Institute, the Boston College Arts Council, and the BC Developmental Technologies (DevTech) Research Group.

Over 24 hours, students were challenged to develop a physical, creative object in response to one of three tracks: Art, DevTech, and Sustainability.

This year, I had the privilege of judging for the first time, alongside returning judge Erik Sjostrom, to represent the Schiller Institute. It was rewarding to witness the full range of students' creativity, dedication, and problem-solving on display. The top three overall teams were awarded 3D printers, while each track's sponsor also recognized standout projects with additional prizes.



#### The Public Philosophy Initiative



# **LEAPS Sustainability Conference**



Join us on **April 24th**, **9AM - 2PM on Zoom** to discuss research and innovations in global textile waste!

This conference grew out of research conducted with the support of Schiller Institute seed grant funding and addresses textile pollution, a form of environmental racism, that severely impacts countries in the Global South. Awareness of its public health implications remains low, despite over 34 billion pounds of textile waste generated annually in the U.S. There is a gap in understanding how individuals, especially youth, can take meaningful political and community action to address this issue and bring about local and systemic change.
