What Are Schiller Students Up To?

We are excited to congratulate Morrissey College junior Ashley Delgado! She is this year's Romero Scholarship winner and is passionate about housing advocacy and legal empowerment. She is also on the 2025 Chile project team for our Working For and With Communities class!



Delgado's academic pursuits combine a business foundation with a deep interest in public policy and urban development. A double major in political science and communication with a minor in general business, she also completed the Carroll School of Management's Catalyst Program, a summer initiative for non-management students which provides a broad foundation in the functional areas of management.

"The work that we do is not about [the] spotlight. It is not about self. It's about something far greater —it's about restoring what's been broken, healing what's been ignored, and uplifting the dignity of those in the world who are often overlooked," she said in her acceptance speech.

"Housing justice is not just about units. It's about people, about families that deserve permanence, not precarity," said Delgado, who hopes to launch a Latino housing justice initiative focused on helping families find stable housing amid ongoing cycles of housing insecurity.



...And Where Do They Go?



"My name is Gustavo Cardona e Almeida, and I recently completed my Master's in Applied Economics at Boston College. Before that, my academic path took me from Curitiba, Brazil, where I earned my bachelor's degree in Economics at the Pontifical Catholic University of Paraná, to St Mary's University in London, where I did my Master's in International Business.

After London, I applied to Boston College, drawn by its Jesuit values, commitment to community, and strong academic reputation. While studying in the Engineering building at Boston College, I came across a banner inviting students to apply as delegates for COP29, held in Baku, Azerbaijan. I submitted my application...a few months later, I received an email: I had been selected. What happened next in Baku changed me forever.

We shared countless hours discussing climate policy, sustainable development, and our hopes for

the future. One of the most unforgettable moments for me was meeting key environmental leaders from around the world, from U.S. Senator and BC alum Ed Markey, to Brazilian senators, ministers and especially Judge Herman Benjamin, Chief Judge of the National High Court of Brazil and a leading mind in environmental law in the country.

A few months later, I had been accepted to pursue a Ph.D. in Finance at the Pontifical Catholic University of Paraná, in Curitiba, a city recognised for its environmental innovation and sustainable projects. My research will focus on green finance and sustainable investment.


The journey between the two regions took nearly 40 hours by train, but she enjoyed the journey, finding it interesting to see different landscapes and regions pass by.



She spent seven years at Lanzhou University, taking part in its prestigious chemistry program, which is where she earned her B.S. in Chemistry and M.S. in Analytical Chemistry. Eager to pursue a higher level of education as well as experience a different lifestyle, she went to the United States and earned her Ph.D. in Physical Chemistry at Emory University. Following that, she completed her postdoctoral research at Argonne National Laboratory. After finishing her studies, she started a career as an assistant professor at Marguette University in Milwaukee, later earning tenure and a promotion to associate professor. After nearly a decade there, she transferred to Boston College, where she now works as a Professor of Chemistry and a core faculty member at the Schiller Institute for Integrated Science and Society.

Jier's research focuses on solar energy conversion. Since her college days, she has always been passionate about methods of utilizing solar energy. In her lab, she uses ultrafast laser spectroscopy—a unique technique—to observe molecular behaviors critical to solar energy processes.

Outside of work, she enjoys hiking, gardening, and spending time with friends. She is grateful to have made plenty of close friends in her short span of time living in Boston. She is also a proud mother of two teenage sons and a dog named Coconut who you might spot on campus if you're lucky!


Linking Knowledge with Action to Support Sustainable Development





EARTH WEEK PRESENTS

LINKING KNOWLEDGE WITH ACTION TO SUPPORT SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT



Global Sustainability has long been a vision for a world in which people's well-

being in the here and now is enhanced without compromising the ability of people elsewhere or in the future to define and promote their own wellbeing. The pursuit of sustainability is ultimately a political process requiring constant efforts to combat barriers of power, corruption and inequity. But it is also an intellectual process requiring constant efforts to experiment, discover and innovate. This seminar reviews what has been learned about the challenges of – and opportunities for -- linking knowledge with action to support sustainable development in our chaotic and polarized world. The presenter, William Clark, is the Harvey Brooks Research Professor of International Science, Public Policy and Human Development at Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government. His research seeks to advance the goal of sustainable development: equitable improvements in people's well-being, achieved in ways that do not diminish the potential of people in other places or future generations to pursue their own well-being. In particular, he focuses on institutions and practices that facilitate linking knowledge with action in pursuit of sustainability.


LEAPS Sustainability Conference

discuss research and innovations in global textile waste!

This conference grew out of research conducted with the support of Schiller Institute seed grant funding and addresses textile pollution, a form of environmental racism, that severely impacts countries in the Global South. Awareness of its public health implications remains low, despite over 34 billion pounds of textile waste generated annually in the U.S. There is a gap in understanding how individuals, especially youth, can take meaningful political and community action to address this issue and bring about local and systemic change.
